Hello Residents, Families and Friends!

This month, we highlight two special celebrations:

Kings Birthday - celebrating NZers' achievements

Dozens of New Zealanders will be given royal honours for excellence in their fields. Honours are given out – twice a year – the other being on New Year's Eve.



Literally anyone can nominate someone living who they think deserves a Royal Honour. The Honours Unit at the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet processes between 800 to 1000 nominations a year.

Once the draft list is set, it is then given informal approval by the governor-general, run by potential recipients first - "a small number decline," - and then it's off to the King, who is the head of our honours system.

Mataraki - Growing traditions

Historically Matariki, the Maori new year celebrations provided the opportunity for whānau (family) to come together to acknowledge the year gone by, prepare and plan for the year ahead; to celebrate with kai (food), kōrero (speak or share stories), ceremony and entertainment. Today, we are encouraged to celebrate the unique places we live in, show respect for the land we live on, and to share and grow together.

Clinical Manager's Desk

As previously mentioned, we are directed by Nga Paerewa, Health and Disability Standards, which guide us in caring for you. Previously I posted Outcome no. 1, Your rights.

Outcome 2: Person-centred

Ngā Paerewa is a set of standards for health and disability services in New Zealand. Outcome 2 refers to the "person-centred" approach, emphasizing that care should be respectful, empathetic, and compassionate, and tailored to individual needs and preferences. It also highlights the importance of cultural appropriateness and involving whānau (family) in the process.

How do we at Hetherington House accomplish this?

Respectful and Compassionate Care:

Providing care that is sensitive to your individual needs, preferences, and cultural backgrounds.

Person-Centred Approach:

Focusing on the individual's needs and preferences, rather than simply on a diagnosis or condition.

Cultural Appropriateness:

Ensuring that care is culturally sensitive and respectful of Māori values and beliefs.

Involving Whānau:

Engaging whānau (family) in care planning and decision-making where appropriate.

Collaboration and Partnership:

Working collaboratively with individuals, their families, and other relevant stakeholders.

We obtain this information when you are admitted to the facility.

The nurses ask you questions about your health, engaging you and your family. The Diversional Therapists also have a chat with you and your family to establish what makes you happy, your hobbies, past interests so that we can see how best to meet your needs while you are with us.



The gentleman asked: 'For you to buy booze?'


